




Who We **Serve**

Coming Home:

From HOMELESS to HOUSED



The Paul Downey Senior Residence

is now home to 88 seniors who struggled to find affordable housing. Today, they live in a warm, welcoming place they are delighted to call home.

The Clairemont Housing Campus features the bright and beautiful Judith L. Seltz Senior Wellness Center providing fitness classes, cultural enrichment, and weekly arts and crafts classes.

Open to the public, the Judith L. Seltz Wellness Center offers no-cost dining for seniors 60+ in need for a nutritious meal in a comfortable, inviting environment.

Emergency Shelter Housing Program



Serving Seniors' Emergency **Shelter Housing** Program provide older adults with transitional or emergency housing and supportive services as a pathway to permanent affordable housing.

Shallow Rental Subsidies

Working with expanded funding from community partnerships with the Lucky Duck Foundation and the Rancho Santa Fe Foundation, and assistance from the San Diego Housing Commission, Serving Seniors prevents older adults from becoming homeless.

Our programs stabilized housing for 49 seniors living in poverty

Small monthly payments of \$300 to \$500 have proven to be the most effective, cost-efficient way to prevent older adult homelessness.

Case managers provided 1,266 financial literacy and wellness visits

What's really exciting is that we have the capacity to serve even more seniors!"

Our Senior Nutrition Program is at the heart of everything we do, providing healthy meals that keep older adults nourished in mind, body, and spirit.

Serving Seniors is the single largest provider of meals to San Diego County older adults. We have provided meals for 55 years.

The balanced meals served at congregate dining sites throughout San Diego County and delivered to the doors of thousands of seniors represent a lifeline for older adults struggling with limited resources.

As people age, their health needs increase. Older adults in poverty suffer higher rates of chronic illness and disabilities, which only worsen as they go untreated.

In addition, they suffer from loneliness and social isolation, which are associated with higher risks for health problems such as heart disease, depression, and cognitive decline.

The Serving Seniors team of dedicated health educators, case managers, and care navigators can help low-income and homeless

older adults address their health needs to improve their wellbeing and quality of life.

Over the past 12 months, Serving Seniors' clients could access classes, celebrations, and community an average of four times daily throughout our network of wellness centers and supportive housing – 1,700 individual events on the calendar.

Our health and wellness activities and our social events promote healthy living, reduce isolation and allow older adults to live life to the fullest, surrounded by friends and neighbors.

All activities are offered free through the generous sponsors of our corporate and community partners, including ASML, SDGE, and the San Diego Seniors Community Foundation.

Living Life to the Fullest

Improved financial literacy skills for more than 300 seniors through our expanded corporate partnership with US Bank.

Added new health class options including bonebuilding, cardio drumming, and yoga.

Cultural and creative arts events include Artopia,
Senior Idol, Chinese New Year Celebration, karaoke, and
cooking demonstrations.

More than **1,200** seniors participated on average each month, and more than **eight in ten** participants reported improved social connections, and less isolation and loneliness.




